Welcome to Emmanuel Episcopal Church, Wakefield, MA Belong, Be Loved, Flourish!

We are thrilled that you are here to worship with us today! Indeed, we welcome every person without exception in the name of Jesus Christ. You *belong* here and are an essential part of our family. We here at Emmanuel believe that God is present in each person and celebrate that you are *beloved by God*. In our community life, we strive to "love God and love our neighbor," affirming that God created us for a relationship that leads to all creation *flourishing*. We pray you are drawn to healing and joy with God by being here today.

If this is your first time with us or your first time back in a while, please fill out the visitor's card in the pew or the Narthex (the entrance hall). We are a friendly family, so please introduce yourself to everyone, especially our rector, Reverend Brett.

A Note about Communion

The most important thing to know is that *you are welcome*. God invites you to be fed. All are welcome at the altar rail. Please let an usher know if you cannot come forward, and we will come to you.

In our tradition, we believe that taking communion in one kind – taking the bread – bestows the full benefit of the sacrament. Therefore, you may choose not to take the wine. Here at Emmanuel, we practice the Common Cup; no intinction (dipping) as it is a higher risk activity than drinking from the chalice. If you would not like to receive, we encourage you to come forward, cross your arms across your chest, and allow the clergy to bless you. We offer consecrated gluten-free wafers and a non-alcohol alternative; simply let the clergy know.

Remember: this is God's table and you are welcome to meet God here!





Will the hearts of the prophets ever turn back—those who prophesy lies, and who prophesy the deceit of their own heart? They plan to make my people forget my name by their dreams that they tell one another, just as their ancestors forgot my name for Baal. Let the prophet who has a dream tell the dream, but let the one who has my word speak my word faithfully. What has straw in common with wheat? says the LORD. Is not my word like fire, says the LORD, and like a hammer that breaks a rock in pieces?

SECOND LESSON: HEBREWS 11:29-12:2

By faith the people passed through the Red Sea as if it were dry land, but when the Egyptians attempted to do so they were drowned. By faith the walls of Jericho fell after they had been encircled for seven days. By faith Rahab the prostitute did not perish with those who were disobedient, because she had received the spies in peace.

And what more should I say? For time would fail me to tell of Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, of David and Samuel and the prophets~ who through faith conquered kingdoms, administered justice, obtained promises, shut the mouths of lions, quenched raging fire, escaped the edge of the sword, won strength out of weakness, became mighty in war, put foreign armies to flight. Women received their dead by resurrection. Others were tortured, refusing to accept release, in order to obtain a better resurrection. Others suffered mocking and flogging, and even chains and imprisonment. They were stoned to death, they were sawn in two, they were killed by the sword; they went about in skins of sheep and goats, destitute, persecuted, tormented~ of whom the world was not worthy. They wandered in deserts and mountains, and in caves and holes in the ground.


Yet all these, though they were commended for their faith, did not receive what was promised, since God had provided something better so that they would not, apart from us, be made perfect.

Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of

our faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross, disregarding its shame, and has taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God.







For us to flourish, we must drench everything we do in prayer. (If any of you is lacking in wisdom, ask God, who gives to all generously and ungrudgingly, and it will be given you. James 1:5).

Intercession is not magical thinking. From its Latin roots (*intercedere*), when we come alongside someone in prayer, we are "standing between" or "standing in the midst" of their need and the throne of Grace and Mercy. We truly are "companioning" them. Initially, one member of the team will offer the prayer while the other stands by in support.



What is that word he keeps saying? What does Basileia mean?

Jesus' stated purpose is clear: "I must proclaim the good news of the kingdom of God" (Lk. 4:43). The word translated as "kingdom" (basileia) is far richer and more meaningful for us as followers of Jesus. I want you to know that Jesus longs for us to strive for this truth now, even as it will not be ultimately fulfilled until the end of the age! Basileia is the "establishment of complete salvific communion between humanity and God, among human beings, within human persons, and between humanity and the rest of creation." Or, more simply, "full communion, full flourishing!"
