

#### Welcome to Emmanuel Episcopal Church, Wakefield, MA Belong, Be Loved, Flourish!

We are thrilled that you are here to worship with us today! Indeed, we welcome every person without exception in the name of Jesus Christ. You *belong* here and are an essential part of our family. We celebrate that you are *beloved by God*. We strive to "love God and love our neighbor," affirming that God created us for a relationship that leads to all creation *flourishing*. We pray you are drawn to healing and joy by being here today.

If this is your first time with us or your first time back in a while, please fill out the visitor's card in the pew or the Narthex (the entrance hall). We are a friendly family, so please introduce yourself to everyone, especially our rector, Reverend Brett.

#### A Note about Communion

The most important thing to know is that *you are welcome*. God invites you to be fed. All are welcome at the altar rail. Please let an usher know if you cannot come forward, and we will come to you.

The options for receiving wine include the chalice or intinction (dipping cup, a separate cup). In our tradition, we believe that taking communion in one kind – taking the bread – bestows the full benefit of the sacrament. Therefore, you may choose not to take the wine. If you would not like to receive, we encourage you to come forward, cross your arms across your chest, and allow the clergy to bless you. We offer consecrated gluten-free wafers and a non-alcohol alternative; simply let the clergy know.

Remember: this is God's table and you are welcome to meet God here!

#### A Note about Children


We *love* all our children. Most Sundays, we have childcare for the littlest ones alongside our Kids' Club in their special place off the Parish Hall. We encourage your children to gather with their peers there, guided by our team of leaders. Once a month, usually the first Sunday, our children join us in the sanctuary to lead us as ushers and readers and assist Rev. Brett at the altar during Communion.

All children are welcome in the sanctuary! We ask that their big people help to teach them that this is a sacred space for quiet play and quiet voices. This helps ensure we honor those who need to worship in quiet.

SERMON THE REV. BRETT R. JOHNSON

#### NICENE CREED

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.


#### VIngathering Sunday: November 2 − Gratitude Sunday!

#### NOTES FROM THE ORGAN BENCH

This Sunday, we sing a new Agnus Dei, fresh from the 10th century (or thereabouts)!

It comes to us from the treasury of Gregorian chant known as the Kyriale, which includes eighteen settings of the Ordinary: Kyrie, Gloria, Sanctus & Benedictus, and Agnus Dei. To most Roman Catholics today, the most familiar is undoubtedly the eighth, "de Angelis"; in the Episcopal Church, the ninth, "cum Jubilo", is more beloved, due to the efforts of Canon

Charles Winfred Douglas (1867-1944).

He published a translated setting with organ accompaniment in 1915 as "Missa Marialis", for the use of the Community of St. Mary, Peekskill, NY. Selections were included in the 1916 Hymnal, for which he served as musical editor. However, the 1892 Book of Common Prayer retained the Reformation-era omission of the Agnus Dei from Episcopal liturgies; accordingly, its companion Hymnal did not print Douglas's setting of that text.

The Episcopal Church's reclamation of a more fully Catholic liturgical shape proceeded gradually. While the 1928 Prayer Book continued not to explicitly provide for an Agnus Dei, it allowed for "a hymn" to be sung at the appropriate time, and Douglas's Agnus Dei was finally printed in the 1940 Hymnal as part of the "Fourth Communion Service", and again in our own Hymnal 1982.



#### What is that word he keeps saying? What does Basileia mean?

Jesus' stated purpose is clear: "I must proclaim the good news of the kingdom of God" (Lk. 4:43). The word translated as "kingdom" (basileia) is far richer and more meaningful for us as followers of Jesus. Basileia is the "establishment of complete salvific communion between humanity and God, among human beings, within human persons, and between humanity and the rest of creation." Or, more simply, "full communion, full flourishing!"
