The Gathering (please stand as you are able)

Come, all you who are thirsty, come to the waters; and you who have no money, come, buy and eat! Come, buy wine and milk without money and without cost. Why spend money on what is not bread, and your labor on what does not satisfy? Listen, listen to me, and eat what is good, and you will delight in the richest of fare. Give ear and come to me; listen, that you may live. I will make an everlasting covenant with you, my faithful love promised to David. (Isaiah 55:1-3) **Thanks be to God.**

Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light. (Matthew 11:28-30) **Thanks be to God.**

Holy and Healing God, pour out your Holy Spirit on all those gathered here this evening. Strengthen our weary hearts and console us as we come to you, open, in need, in yearning, in curiosity, in silence -- looking for healing and for your great goodness. Bless these moments, Holy Spirit, as we create the space we need to offer the weight of our lives into your compassionate arms. **Amen.**

Officiant: A reading from Psalm 42:8:

"By day the Lord commands his steadfast love, and at night his song is with me, a prayer to the God of my life."

(Pause for stillness) (lights one candle)

Officiant: Your stories have brought you here. Now let us bring them into the light of God. This candle represents our suffering and the suffering of the world. In the light of God's love, we claim God's gift of truth. There is no need to hide or deny. God welcomes us as we are.

All: Incline your ear, O Lord, and answer me, for I am poor and needy. (Psalm 86)

(Pause for stillness) (lights another candle)

Officiant: This candle represents our suffering and the suffering of the world. In the light of God's love, we claim God's gift of lament. We recognize our wounds and cry out to God. We accept God's invitation to express every feeling and question.

All: My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? Why are you so far from helping me, from the words of my groaning? O my God, I cry by day, but you do not answer; and by night, but find no rest. (Psalm 22:1-2)

(Pause for stillness) (lights another candle)

Officiant: This candle represents our suffering and the suffering of the world. In the light of God's love, we claim God's gift of courage. Courage to be honest, to seek help, to comfort one another. Courage to dare to love and dream again.

All: The Lord is my strength and my shield; in him my heart trusts; so I am helped, and my heart exults, and with my song I give thanks to him. (Psalm 28:7)

(Pause for stillness) (lights another candle)

Officiant: This candle represents our suffering and the suffering of the world. In the light of God's love, we claim God's gift of hope. God is good. God is strong. God is near, leading us to a day without tears and pain, without sin and death. Healing and deliverance are coming; if not now, then on that day.

All: By awesome deeds you answer us with deliverance, O God of our salvation; you are the hope of all the ends of the earth and of the farthest seas. (Psalm 65:5)

(Pause for stillness) (lights final candle)



Reflection

(silence will be kept for personal stillness)

Prayers of the People A Litany of Healing

(Please stand or kneel as you are able)

Intercessor: In the spirit of this season let us thank God for the blessings in our lives and ask God for all the things we need. We give you thanks for this gathered community and we give you thanks for all the many blessings of this life.

People: Hear us, O God of life.

Intercessor: Remember and grant your healing grace to all who are sick, injured or disabled; and restore those in emotional distress to soundness of mind and serenity or spirit.

People: Hear us, O God of life.

Intercessor: May the power of your holy presence clear a path through the rubble of broken lives and hearts to make our world and all of us a new creation. For ourselves as we prepare and participate in whatever ways we can this Advent and Christmas season, help us to be merciful with our selves. Grant us wisdom, courage, and patience for the days ahead.

People: Hear us, O God of life.

Intercessor: Grant to all who seek your guidance, and to all who are lonely, anxious or despondent, a knowledge of your will and an awareness of your presence.

People: Hear us, O God of life.

Intercessor: For our families, friends, and neighbors, and for all who have commended themselves to our prayers: that you may watch over them and intervene to heal them in the places of which only you and they know. Mend broken relationships within our families; and

forgive us for the brokenness we have caused, the hurt we have produced, the sins we have committed.

People: Hear us, O God of life.

Intercessor: Look with compassion upon the hurting places of our world, especially Ukraine, Palestine, Israel, and our own nation. Shelter and protect us and our neighbors who live in any kind of danger, particularly from gun violence, prejudice and oppression, and cruel and lawless authorities. Make us all a generous people so that no one lives in need or want of food, housing, and healthcare. Save us from weak resignation and bring us peace with justice.

People: Hear us, O God of life.

Intercessor: Bless all who minister to those who suffer, granting them wisdom and skill, sympathy and patience.

People: Hear us, O God of life.

Intercessor: Grant to the dying peace and a holy death, and uphold by the grace and consolation of your Holy Spirit all who are bereaved.

People: Hear us, O God of life.

Intercessor: Bless all who have died, that they may have rest in that place where there is no pain or grief, but life eternal.

People: Hear us, O God of life.

Intercessor: You are a God who does wonders

People: You have declared your power among the peoples.

Intercessor: With you, God, is the well of life.

People: The darkness and the light, to you, are both alike.

Intercessor: Hear us, O God of life. People: **Heal and restore us, O God.**


Intercessor: Grant, O Lord, to all who are in sorrow the spirit of faith and courage, that they may have strength to meet the days to come;



As you come forward, bring your piece of paper with your burdens and sorrows and place it in the large bowl in front of God's table.

They will not be read.

You are welcome to light a candle in remembrance, for any special intention, or for laying down your private burdens.

Intercessor: Keep watch, dear Lord, with those who work, or watch, or weep this night, and give your angels charge over all of us. Tend the sick, Lord Christ; give rest to the weary, bless the dying, soothe the suffering, pity the afflicted, shield the joyous; and all for your love's sake. **Amen.**

We pray together, remaining seated:

Almighty God, we thank you for your constant love. We know that even when we cannot see or feel you, still you are there. Help us to remember you and to listen for your voice in the words of family, friends, and strangers. Kindle our hearts and awaken hope, that we may know you as you reveal yourself in the world and in our lives. Let the light of your holy Spirit shine like these candles in the darkness, lighting the way for all who feel despairing, lost, or forgotten, and grant that it may come to dwell so deeply in our hearts that when we leave this place it may shine on, for us and for those we meet along the way. Amen.

CONCLUDING BLESSING

Officiant: My friends, life is short, and we do not have much time to gladden the hearts of those who are on this journey with us. So be swift to love and hasten to be kind, and always, always offer hospitality to the stranger.

May the God of Grace heal you, body and soul.

May your pain cease.

May your strength increase.

May your fears and worries be released.

And may blessings, love, and joy surround you—now and always. **Amen.**

As we prepare to leave this sacred space, may you feel uplifted and cleansed, lightened and refreshed. May the love of God surround you, the peace of Christ fill your hearts, and the Holy Spirit guide your steps in the days to come. **Amen**.

And the blessings of God who made us, who loves us, and who travels with us, be with you and those you love now and always. **Amen.**

Please stay as long as you wish. When you are ready, please exit quietly, respecting the silence for others.
