The Lessons

The First Lesson

Job 29:1,30:1-2,16-31

A Reading from the Book of Job.

Job again took up his discourse and said:

“But now they make sport of me, those who are younger than I, whose fathers I would have disdained to set with the dogs of my flock. What could I gain from the strength of their hands? All their vigor is gone. “And now my soul is poured out within me; days of affliction have taken hold of me. The night racks my bones, and the pain that gnaws me takes no rest. With violence he seizes my garment; he grasps me by the collar of my tunic. He has cast me into the mire, and I have become like dust and ashes. I cry to you and you do not answer me; I stand, and you merely look at me. You have turned cruel to me; with the might of your hand you persecute me. You lift me up on the wind, you make me ride on it, and you toss me about in the roar of the storm. I know that you will bring me to death, and to the house appointed for all living. “Surely one does not turn against the needy, when in disaster they cry for help. Did I not weep for those whose day was hard? Was not my soul grieved for the poor? But when I looked for good, evil came; and when I waited for light, darkness came. My inward parts are in turmoil, and are never still; days of affliction come to meet me. I go about in sunless gloom; I stand up in the assembly and cry for help. I am a brother of jackals, and a companion of ostriches. My skin turns black and falls from me, and my bones burn with heat. My lyre is turned to mourning, and my pipe to the voice of those who weep.

The Second Lesson

John 11: 1-16

A Reading from the Gospel according to John.

Now a certain man was ill, Lazarus of Bethany, the village of Mary and her sister Martha. Mary was the one who anointed the Lord with perfume and wiped his feet with her hair; her brother Lazarus was ill. So the sisters sent a message to Jesus, "Lord, he whom you love is ill." But when Jesus heard it, he said, "This illness does not lead to death; rather it is for God's glory, so that the Son of God may be glorified through it." Accordingly, though Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus, after having heard that Lazarus was ill, he stayed two days longer in the place where he was. Then after this he said to the disciples, "Let us go to Judea again." The disciples said to him, "Rabbi, the Jews were just now trying to stone you, and are you going there again?" Jesus answered, "Are there not twelve hours of daylight? Those who walk during the day do not stumble, because they see the light of this world. But those who walk at night stumble, because the light is not in them." After saying this, he told them, "Our friend Lazarus has fallen asleep, but I am going there to awaken him." The disciples said to him, "Lord, if he has fallen asleep, he will be all right." Jesus, however, had been speaking about his death, but they thought that he was referring merely to sleep. Then Jesus told them plainly, "Lazarus is dead. For your sake I am glad I was not there, so that you may believe. But let us go to him." Thomas, who was called the Twin, said to his fellow disciples, "Let us also go, that we may die with him."

Canticle N. A Song of Christ's Humility

Philippians 2: 6-11

Though in the form of God, *
Christ Jesus did not cling to equality with God,

**But emptied himself, taking the form of a servant, *
and was born in human likeness.**

Being found in human form, he humbled himself *
and became obedient to death, even death on a cross.

**Therefore, God has highly exalted him *
and given him the name above every name,**

That at the name of Jesus, every knee shall bow, *
in heaven and on earth and under the earth,

**And every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, *
to the glory of God the Father.**

Reverend Alexander Crummell was a pioneering African American Episcopal priest, missionary, educator, abolitionist, and scholar. Although denied admission to General Theological Seminary because of his race, he pursued theological studies elsewhere and was ordained an Episcopal deacon in 1842 and priest in 1844.

He spent approximately twenty years in Liberia, serving as an Episcopal missionary, priest, educator, and professor at Liberia College. Returning to the United States in 1873, Crummell settled in Washington, D.C., where he became an important leader among Black Episcopalians. In 1883, he organized the Conference of Church Workers Among Colored People, an organization that eventually contributed to the development of the Union of Black Episcopalians. In 1897, shortly before his death, he founded the American Negro Academy, promoting scholarship and intellectual achievement among African Americans.

For the Episcopal Church today, Crummell's legacy is especially significant: he combined deep Christian faith with a commitment to education, racial justice, Black leadership, and the creation of institutions where Black people could exercise their gifts and leadership.
