The Lessons

The First Lesson

Acts 8:14-25

A Reading from Acts

Now when the apostles at Jerusalem heard that Samaria had accepted the word of God, they sent Peter and John to them. The two went down and prayed for them that they might receive the Holy Spirit (for as yet the Spirit had not come* upon any of them; they had only been baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus). Then Peter and John* laid their hands on them, and they received the Holy Spirit. Now when Simon saw that the Spirit was given through the laying on of the apostles' hands, he offered them money, saying, 'Give me also this power so that anyone on whom I lay my hands may receive the Holy Spirit.' But Peter said to him, 'May your silver perish with you, because you thought you could obtain God's gift with money! You have no part or share in this, for your heart is not right before God. Repent therefore of this wickedness of yours, and pray to the Lord that, if possible, the intent of your heart may be forgiven you. For I see that you are in the gall of bitterness and the chains of wickedness.' Simon answered, 'Pray for me to the Lord, that nothing of what you* have said may happen to me.'

Now after Peter and John* had testified and spoken the word of the Lord, they returned to Jerusalem, proclaiming the good news to many villages of the Samaritans.

Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people.

The Second Lesson

John 6: 1-15

A Reading from the Gospel according to John.

After this Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him, Jesus said to Philip, "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost." So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world."

When Jesus realized that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself.

Canticle N. A Song of God's Love

1 John 4: 7-11

Beloved, let us love one another, *
for love is of God.

**Whoever does not love does not know God, *
for God is Love.**

In this the love of God was revealed among us, *
that God sent his only Son into the world,
so that we might live through Jesus Christ.

**In this is love, not that we loved God but that God loved us *
and sent his Son that sins might be forgiven.**

Beloved, since God loved us so much, *
we ought also to love one another.

**For if we love one another, God abides in us, *
and God's love will be perfected in us.**

***Manteo and Virginia Dare** were the first people baptized into the Anglican church in North America.*

- *Manteo, an indigenous leader, traveled to England in 1584–1585 with an English expedition led by Sir Walter Raleigh. He was baptized in England in 1587, apparently as part of the English effort to establish relationships and promote Christianity among Indigenous peoples. Manteo later returned to Roanoke and was given the title ‘Lord of Roanoke.’*
- *Virginia Dare was born on August 18, 1587, at the Roanoke Colony—the first child of English parents born in the English colony in North America. She was the granddaughter of John White, governor of the colony. She was baptized in the colony on August 20, 1587, just three days after her birth.*

The circumstances are significant because the baptisms took place amid European colonization, English hopes for Christian evangelization, and complex relationships with Indigenous communities. Manteo's baptism represented an intentional effort to build an alliance with an Indigenous leader, while Virginia Dare's baptism became a powerful symbol of England's hoped-for permanent presence in North America.

The story is also complicated by what happened afterward: John White returned to England for supplies, but when he came back to Roanoke in 1590, the colonists—including Virginia Dare—had disappeared. The fate of Virginia and the other colonists remains unknown.
